TITLE OF BILL : An act to amend the election law, in relation to prohibiting multiple party designations for candidates for public office and to repeal subdivision 6 of section 7-104 of such law relating thereto

PURPOSE OR GENERAL IDEA OF BILL: The purpose of this bill is to prohibit multiple party designations for candidates for public office, except for judicial offices.

SUMMARY OF SPECIFIC PROVISIONS: Section 1) Amends section 6-146 of the election law to provide: THAT IF A PERSON WHO HAS BEEN DESIGNATED AS A CANDIDATE FOR THE NOMINATION OF MORE THAN ONE PARTY FOR THE SAME PUBLIC OFFICE, EXCEPT JUDICIAL OFFICE, ACCEPTS THE DESIGNATION OF A PARTY OF WHICH HE IS NOT ENROLLED, ALL OTHER SUCH DESIGNATIONS OF SUCH CANDIDATE FOR SUCH OFFICE SHALL BE DEEMED TO HAVE BEEN DECLINED. IF THE PERSON WHO ACCEPTS THE NOMINATION OF AN INDEPENDENT BODY FOR AN OFFICE, EXCEPT JUDICIAL OFFICE, IS ALSO NOMINATED BY A PARTY FOR SUCH OFFICE SUCH NOMINATION OF SUCH INDEPENDENT BODY SHALL BE DEEMED TO HAVE BEEN DECLINED.

Section 2) Amends subdivision 5 of section 7-104 of the election law to provide that: NO PERSON MAY BE THE CANDIDATE OF MORE THAN ONE PARTY OR INDEPENDENT BODY OF THE SAME OFFICE, EXCEPT JUDICIAL OFFICE.

Section 3) Subdivision 6 of section 7-104 of the election law is repealed and subdivisions 7, 8, 9, and 10 are renumbered 6, 7, 8, and 9.

Section 4) Effective date.

JUSTIFICATION: The existence of a multiple party system in New York State offers diverse groups an opportunity to nominate candidates who may articulate the ideology and public policy goals of constituencies whose views they share. Providing this opportunity for electoral participation is a fundamental tenet of our system of democratic government.

At the same time, however, permitting candidates for elective office to secure the cross-endorsements of two or more political parties not only erodes the two party system, but also effectively deprives minor party candidates of a place on the ballot and the opportunity to compete for votes based upon the ideologies, values and party platform goals that the minor party purports to represent.

This bill proposes to prohibit multiple party designations by candidates for public office, except judicial office.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act shall take effect on the first of December next succeeding the date on which it shall have become a law.

PURPOSE OF BILL :    Relates to the terms of office of commissioners of election.

SUMMARY OF SPECIFIC PROVISIONS :    This act shall amend Subdivision 1 of section 3-202 of the election law. It will extend the term of office of an election commissioner to a four year period statewide beginning January 1st of each odd numbered year.

JUSTIFICATIONS : The term of office of an election commissioner is two years, by amending this section it would extend the term to a four year period to conform the rest of the State to the same term as the commissioners in New York City and the Counties of Allegany, Broome, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Erie, Franklin, Fulton, Genesee, Greene, Hamilton, Herkimer, Livingston, Madison, Monroe, Ontario, Orange, Putnam, Rockland, St. Lawrence, Saratoga, Schenectady, Seneca, Suffolk, Sullivan, Tioga, Warren, Washington, and Wyoming.

TITLE OF BILL : An act to amend the election law, in relation to employment of election inspectors

PURPOSE OR GENERAL IDEA OF BILL : To allow the local boards of elections to utilize election inspectors for half-day shifts

SUMMARY OF SPECIFIC PROVISIONS : This bill amends section 3-400 of the election law to authorize local boards of elections to employ election inspectors to work half-day shifts, provided that at least one inspector from each of the two major political parties is present at the poll site for the entire time that the polls are open.

JUSTIFICATION : The adoption of new voting machines pursuant to the federal Help America Vote Act and New York laws implementing HAVA, requires that local boards of elections have flexibility when employing election inspectors. This bill provides such flexibility without requiring the use of half-day election inspectors.

PURPOSE OR GENERAL IDEA OF BILL : The bill would require schools throughout the state to be closed on the day of the general election in November. This will allow boards of elections to utilize schools for poll sites more often while safeguarding schoolchildren and eliminating the interruption of instruction in the classroom on election day.

SUMMARY OF SPECIFIC PROVISIONS : Section 1 of the bill amends subdivision 8 of section 3604 of the education law to remove general election day from the list of days exempted from mandatory school closure.

Section 2 is the effective date.

JUSTIFICATION :

The need for suitable poll sites on election day has never been greater. Across New York state, new ballot marking devices will be placed in each poll site beginning with the primary election in September 2008 to allow individuals with disabilities to vote privately and independently. However, while ballot marking devices may be accessible, many poll sites are not. In the near future, all existing voting machines in New York will be replaced by electronic optical scanners which have numerous features that the current machines do not and that will require a reconfiguration of election districts and poll sites to maximize the efficient use of the new machines.

Schools are ideal poll sites because they are public buildings, usually are accessible to the disabled and have ample parking. The election law reflects a preference for using schools as poll sites by stating:

A building exempt from taxation shall be used whenever possible as a polling place if it is situated in the same or a contiguous election district, and may contain as many distinctly separate polling places as public convenience may require. The expense, if any, incidental to its use, shall be paid like the expense of other places of registration and voting. If a board or body empowered to designate polling places chooses a public school building for such purpose, the board or agency which controls such building must make available a room or rooms in such building which are suitable for registration and voting and which are as close as possible to a convenient entrance to such building and must make available any such room or rooms which the board or body designating such building determines are accessible to physically disabled voters as provided in subdivision one-a

(Election Law S 4-104 3 emphasis added ). However, the use of schools for poll sites when school is in session often disturbs the usual schedule of the entire school day, as well as the instruction occurring in individual classrooms. Moreover, increased concerns about the safety of schoolchildren while at school makes school officials reluctant to open up their schools for a public use while children are present in the schools.

By requiring that schools be closed statewide on election day, as they are in New York City currently, this bill would increase the availability of accessible public buildings for poll sites while causing minimal disruption to a school and no security risks to students.

TITLE OF BILL: An act to amend the election law, in relation to the alteration of election districts by the board of elections; and to repeal certain provisions of such law relating thereto

PURPOSE OR GENERAL IDEA OF BILL: The bill is intended to provide the

boards of elections flexibility regarding election districts to capitalize on the features and capabilities of the new voting machines which will replace the existing voting machines and to ensure that poll sites have adequate space.

SUMMARY OF SPECIFIC PROVISIONS: Section 1 of the bill repeals election law S 4-100(6) which allows a board of elections to alter election district lines when a legislative body of a town or city fails to do so and grants the boards of elections the authority to create, consolidate, divide or alter election districts.

Section 2 of the bill provides a one time waiver of the prohibition on consolidating election districts between February twentieth of a calendar year ending in seven and December first of a calendar year ending in zero, provided that the outer boundary or perimeter of the consolidated districts is not altered.

Section 3 of the bill provides that polling places using new voting machines or systems may contain more than 1 election district provided that such voting machine or system produces separate and distinct vote totals for each election district.

Section 4 of the bill provides that a poll site must be of sufficient size to accommodate voting machines and privacy booths as required by state board of elections rules and regulations. It also provides that the number of voting machines, election workers and election resources must be sufficient to accommodate the number of voters eligible to vote in such poll site.

Section 5 of the bill is the effective date.

JUSTIFICATION: In 2005, the election law was amended to provide that the boards of elections throughout the state assume possession and ownership of all voting machines and that such boards designate poll site locations. In 2009 and 2010, New York State will be replacing the existing mechanical voting machines with electronic voting machines that comply with the Help America Vote Act and recently enacted state law. This bill is intended to balance the desire to keep costs down with the efficient and orderly administration of elections.

The new machines have features and capabilities, such as the ability to tabulate multiple official ballots that the current machines do not. The bill allows the use of one machine for more than one election district provided it produces separate and distinct totals for each election district. The boards of elections should be given the authority to

create, consolidate, divide or alter election districts, in addition to picking the poll sites, to best utilize the new machines. The other provision in the bill, the 1 time waiver, is also intended to reflect the capabilities of the new machines and provide flexibility as New York makes the transition to new voting machines. Finally, in order to prevent drastic cost cutting measures that could render elections chaotic or slow, the bill requires that sufficient space, voting machines, election workers and resources be provided to accommodate those voters that are eligible to vote at a poll site.

PRIOR LEGISLATIVE HISTORY: None

FISCAL IMPLICATION: This bill would allow the boards of elections to better utilize their voting machines and reduce the cost of running elections.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act shall take effect immediately.

PURPOSE OF BILL : Relates to the appointment of commissioners of election

SUMMARY OF SPECIFIC PROVISIONS : This act shall amend Section 1. Subdivision 4 of section 3-204 of the election law, as amended by chapter 455 of the laws of 1984. It shall provide for commissioners of election to be appointed by the county legislative body, or in the

city of New York, by the city council. Provided, however, that the legislative body shall automatically approve any recommendations for commissioners of elections by a party.



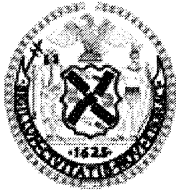

**MAYOR BLOOMBERG ANNOUNCES APPOINTMENT OF MICAH LASHER AS DIRECTOR OF STATE LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS**

***New Position of Fiscal Director of State Legislative Affairs Created to Increase the City's Advocacy on State Budget Matters***

Mayor Michael R. Bloomberg today announced the appointment of Micah C. Lasher as Director of State Legislative Affairs. As Director, Lasher will be responsible for leading the Administration's State legislative agenda, relations with the Office of the Governor and State legislators and preparing the Administration's response to and negotiation of all proposed State legislation impacting New York City. The Mayor also appointed Timothy F. Mulligan as Fiscal Director of State Legislative Affairs, a newly created position specifically dedicated to working on State budget issues. Lasher currently serves as Executive Director of External Affairs for the Department of Education, where he oversees government affairs, community relations, media relations and the Office for Family Engagement and Advocacy. Working with previous Director of State Legislative Affairs Michelle L. Goldstein, Lasher helped lead the successful effort to negotiate and pass the renewal of mayoral control of the City's school system. Goldstein was appointed Executive Director of the City's Office of Federal Affairs earlier this month. Mulligan currently serves Assistant Director for Intergovernmental Relations for the Office of Management and Budget, where he has worked on all aspects of the State's budget and its impact on New York City, including Tier V pension reform. He also analyzed many pieces of federal legislation, including the impact of American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 on the City. The Mayor also announced Deputy Director of State Legislative Affairs Steven Williams has been given an expanded portfolio and increased responsibilities in advocating for the City in Albany.

"Micah has quickly proven himself to be an invaluable asset to our Administration and New Yorkers will be well served by having an advocate with his skill and dedication working for the City's priorities in Albany," said Mayor Bloomberg. "So many of the City's initiatives require State approval, and we have an ambitious agenda we want to achieve - ensuring the City is being treated fairly in the state budget process, creating an affordable pension system for new City employees, extending the progress in our schools, continuing our fight against illegal guns and reducing the unfunded mandates that unfairly burden city taxpayers. Michelle Goldstein did great work for us over the last three years, and I'm confident that we have the right

leader and we have the right team in place to build on that."

"Creating a new, senior-level position specifically dedicated to working on State budget matters speaks to the importance of the State budget for the City," said Director of the Office of Management and Budget Mark Page. "Tim's constant presence in the State budget process will allow us to efficiently and effectively work to discern the impact of State proposals and ensure the City is treated fairly by the State. During these difficult economic times, we have to identify opportunities to restructure the City-State relationship to achieve joint savings and preserve vital services for New Yorkers and Tim will help lead that effort."

"It's been a great honor working on behalf of the City's schools and I'm humbled that the Mayor is giving me the opportunity to continue that work and responsibility for the City's broader legislative agenda," said Lasher. "I come to the job with great respect for the members of the legislature, and will work day and night to partner with them in seeing the City through these difficult economic times."

Before joining the Bloomberg Administration, Lasher served as a chief aide to U.S. Representative Jerrold L. Nadler and was a founding partner of KnickerbockerSKD, a communications consulting firm advising elected officials at all levels of government, labor unions and leading nonprofits. He holds a bachelor's degree from New York University. He lives on Manhattan's Upper West Side with his wife.

Mulligan will continue in his role as Assistant Director for Intergovernmental Relations for the Office of Management and Budget, which he has held since 2006, while also assuming the new role of Fiscal Director of State Legislative Affairs. Prior to joining OMB, Mulligan served as Deputy Commissioner for Legislative Affairs at the City's Human Resources Administration. He is a graduate of the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs at Princeton University, New York University School of Law and the NYC Urban Fellows Program. He lives in Queens with his wife and their three children.

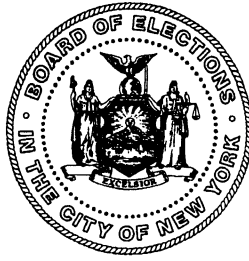

I am writing at the direction of the Commissioners of Elections to alert you that there will be a Special Election for an Assembly District in Queens and to request additional funds for this election event.


Governor David Paterson has executed a Proclamation calling for a Special Election on Tuesday, February 9, 2010 for the 24<sup>th</sup> Assembly District in Queens. This election is necessary due to the vacancy created by the resignation of Assemblyman Mark Weprin, who was elected to the New York City Council during the 2009 General Election. I have taken the liberty of enclosing a copy of Governor Paterson's Proclamation for your review. The cost of this additional election event is anticipated to be \$345,984.

In addition, Council Member Simcha Felder of Brooklyn's 44<sup>th</sup> Council District has announced that he will resign on January 31, 2010 to join the Office of the New York City Comptroller. Should such a vacancy occur, an additional Special Election will be required to fill this City Council position. The cost of this additional election event, which would occur in mid-March, is anticipated to be \$388,416. The combined anticipated cost for both Special Election events is \$734,400.

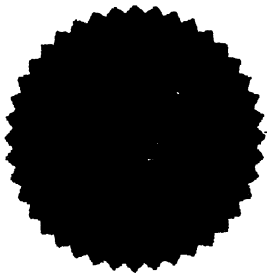

# New scan voting machines reliable move to the future

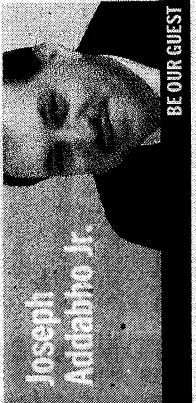
In a recent vote, the New York City Board of Elections chose the Elections System and Software DS200 optical scan voting machines to replace our aged lever machines.

The new machines will be used in this fall's primary and general elections, and will bring greater efficiency and accuracy to the electoral process, while ensuring that every vote cast is counted accurately.

As we prepare for this change, I want to assure all New Yorkers of their reliability. The state Board of Elections engaged in a long and meticulous process over almost three years, and examined every aspect of the programming and operation of these voting machines, including reviewing millions of lines of code, to make sure that they are trustworthy and accurate.

Last year, the Senate Elections Committee took additional steps to ensure that these machines would meet the highest standards and are trustworthy and reliable. Last fall, the state Board of Elections also instituted a pilot program using optical scan machines in 47 of our 62 counties, which proved one thing: These machines produce results that the public can trust.

Voters also can be assured that although we are eliminating the lever, we are instituting the use of paper ballots that are a permanent record and can be used for an audit of the machine results



testing before being used for the first time in this September's primary elections. I encourage and will work with the Board of Elections to inform and train our voters and poll workers to ensure an efficient Election Day operation this year. All New Yorkers can be confident that they will have the most trustworthy and reliable voting machines available.

While some concerns have been expressed regarding privacy due to the layout of the poll sites, as well as difficulties some poll workers have had in operating these machines, these are easily curable election management issues that have nothing to do with reliability. The only instances when the machines reportedly failed to count a vote were when the voter incorrectly marked the ballot in a way that indicated his intention but could not be read by the machines, such as by circling a candidate's name instead of filling in the bubble next to the name.

The machines showed a minimal miscount, mainly from people inserting their ballots incorrectly. There were minor privacy issues, but they were easily rectified.

Throughout this year, the state Board of Elections will work with personnel from Elections Systems & Software to run a series of compliance tests to ensure proper functioning and accuracy. After the machines are delivered to New York City, they will undergo even more

As we make this transition to optical scan voting machines, I look forward to working with individuals across our city to educate voters on their use. I also plan to work with the city Board of Elections to reach out to communities and districts to ensure they have the necessary resources to successfully complete this transition.

I am concerned about the education of our poll workers as well. As chairman of the state Senate Elections Committee, it is my intention to pass whatever legislation we can to make the administration of our elections easier and more effective, such as by allowing poll workers to work half-day shifts, and there is substantial support in the Senate for reforms to accomplish that.

My goals this year as Elections Committee chairman will continue building upon the priorities we had last year: to increase voter turnout because we've made the voting process easy, enjoyable, more accessible and efficient.

State Sen. Joseph Addabbo, a Democrat, represents western Queens' 15th Senate District.
